## Prop-Wash

Well, looks like we made it through another great year of flying events and RDRC continued its pattern of growth by adding several numbers to our membership list. RDRC also gained more recognition in the RC community and really had a strong presence among fly ins across the Midwest and eastern coast. It amazes me how many members of RDRC show up in magazines or on the internet. We have definitely become one of the more well known clubs in America, and we've really established ourselves as a great club among the world of RC. Rumor has it we're getting pretty popular with charity organizations to!;) A lot took place in 2008 with RDRC, and many great events went in to history books. Without doubt, the 2008 FFT was a huge success with life long memories being made on both

days of the event. In spite of going through one of NC's worse droughts, RDRC had its field looking great and the grass runway was in much better shape than ever before. Of course the Big Man upstairs provided the much needed rain to green up the grass, and just a few weeks before the event itself!

As in the past, several improvements were made to our site before the event. We added more electrical outlets, rewired the building, and improved the safety of the existing outside wiring. Already we have plans to add more outlets this year. The addition of more outside outlets will greatly aid club members flying electrics. We also have plans to install small work tables under the shelter. This will provide an area to put your chargers and batteries on while pumping fresh electrons into those batteries! Electric planes have become a huge part of our club now, and we need to address the needs of those modelers.

It's been pretty amazing to see the large numbers of people coming out on these cold days to fly. In years past, cold days at the field look more like a ghost town than a flying field. Not so any more. When the temp's get above 45 now, folks are lining up the flight line! And wind? What Wind? It's a common sight to see our club members all bundled up in the coats negotiating cross wind landings now. I've been out several times this year and watched the wind sock standing straight out, yet members were firing their motors up and pointing it down the runway. THAT'S what I'm talk'n about!\

As I was saying before, RDRC gained several new members this year. That's not that uncommon for a club these days, especially for RDRC. But what does stand out is the caliber of people we gained. Never before have a seen a club acquire so many new folks with the enthusiasm and "Can Do' spirit than RDRC did this year. At the FFT event this year, Jacqui spent most of our drive home time talking about how so many of our new members were working so hard at our event. Heck, we even had non-RDRC members pitching in to help! How cool is that?

And speaking of events! Ya'll best be get'n ready for the RDRC Spring Meet! It's just around the corner folks. April 11th will be here in no time at all, so get out there in the shop and finish up that winter project. I know I've been in the shop quite a bit in recent weeks both building, and making any minor repairs I needed to our fleet. At present, Jacqui and I have 17 planes in the trailer ready to go! Of course, that would be possible if I hadn't had such a good year this past season! How good was it? Well,,,,,,lets just say I came within 4 days of a perfect year! Yup, didn't loose any of my planes until those last days of December when I sent my brand new East RC pre-production Spoiler to its grave,.....on the maiden flight!!!!!! Good news is, I know what caused it. Most common failure in RC. BRAIN FART with the modeler! I had a voltage regulated switch failure causing the airplane to loose all power to the receiver. This wasn't so much the fault of the switch as it was me. Although the switch was supposed to be able to handle an 11 volt battery, it's not common practice to do so. I had a 7 volt battery for the plane, but didn't quite trust it, so I opted to drop in a 2300 mah 11 volt unit. Had all the power I needed, but the additional voltage was more than the regulator liked working with. So, halfway through the flight, it went on strike! Anyway, short story made long, my perfect season wound up in a cardboard box that day!;) By the way, that new East RC Spoiler is one awesome plane! Goes together VERY fast, and the quality of the plane is very nice. After building mine, I responded to Dave and the crew with my comments, and they have already had the changes made for the production models. Just for the record, Spoiler #2 is ready to go! And check this out. It only took about 4 1/2 hours to build! Of course, I did save some time re-using parts from #1 (pull-pull cables, landing gear, servo linkage) but that would only have added about an hour or two. So basically, we're talking about a giant scale plane going together in 5 to 6 hours! You can't beat that folks. Another cool thing about this plane, it has such a wide flight envelope. It flies as slow and easy as ANY trainers out there, but kick up the throws, add some throttle, and you've got one wicked 3D machine! You guys are going to dig this plane.

Another cool plane that's been showing up at RDRC is this really awesome piece of blue foam. Though it may be new to most of you, it's actually been around for quite some time. The plane of course is the works of Robert Vess. It's called the 2EZ, and it's named that for a very good reason. For such a great flying, crash resilient airframe, it's just TOO EASY to build! We've been experimenting with different foams, motors, batteries and servo's for the last few weeks, and our goal is to make this plane as affordable and easy to construct as possible.

For now, we do know this. The best all around motor has been the "Hang It" 2212-06 (EAST RC) out runner. And it's only \$28!!!! Our battery of choice is the Thunder Power 1320 mah 3 cells (East RC)

Speed control needs to be in the 25 amp range. We're using the Castle Creation 25 amp from Horizon Hobby. Servos should be in the 17 to 20 oz of torque range. We're flying most of ours with the JR 285 digitals, but I wanted to try a less expensive servo on the second model, so I used some of my E-Flight S75 foamy servos. They deliver 17 oz of torque and worked just as good. I know East RC has very affordable micros in their store now that should more than fill the bill on this plane. The rest is just a little foam, some simple push rods, and one piece of 3" X 1/8" X 36" balsa. (This is enough to do two planes) I know a lot of you are chomp'n at the bits to get one of

these, but just be a little more patient. We'll have a get together real soon. Until then, be getting those other items together so you'll be able to get it going. Trust me, it wont take you long to build it if you have it all the parts on the table.

So as you can see, 2009 is going to be yet another interesting year at RDRC. Already several cool new planes are on the works, and people are talking about upcoming events.

Just a few more comments before I let go of your ear. First, I'd like to thank RDRC member **Dave Langridge** for taking on the **RDRC Newsletter Editor** for 2209. With his great attitude and vibrant enthusiasm toward this hobby, I know he will do a great job with it. I'd also like to thank **Brandon Hockaday** for doing such an awesome job with it over the last year. Brandon has so many projects and RDRC commitments going on now, that he felt it best to pass the torch on to someone else for the news letter itself. But he will still be very active in several club matters like dues collection, membership cards, and club mailings. Brandon is a good Joe, and I ain't about to let him off Scott free!;)


